For now, Merry Christmas and we will see you in the new vear.

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
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New Year's Resolutions

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A Christmas Carol by Ewan Poole-Gleed

The BLOC Christmas carol service at Cotham Parish Church is an annual tradition, and serves, not just as a joyful celebration of the birth of Jesus Christ but, a way for members of the BLOC company, committee, and Patrons to catch up in between shows. This years' service was certainly one to remember, featuring some inspired readings, beautiful solos, and classic carols.

After the welcoming address by the Reverend Nick Adams, we launched in to "The First Noel", before the first reading from Chervl Batt. Following this, Jack Blackmore performed the first solo, urging us to "Have Yourself a Merry Little Christmas". We, then, had the poem "Christmas Time" read by Gerri Gregory, and then the second carol, "Angels from the Realms of Glory", during which Chris Sterry entered the church just in time for his reading proving that, while a star may guide you to your destination on time, a bus won't!

We then heard Anna
Sutton's rendition of "Thankful",
before the first of two beautiful
violin solos performed by the
young Flora Clapham. She played
"The Holy Boy" with great
panache before the third carol,
"It Came Upon a Midnight Clear",
followed by the Christmas
address by the Reverend.

After a unifying speech from Rev. Nick Adams, the congregation sang "Hark the Herald Angels Sing" before the third reading from Sarah Huckle, and a beautiful rendition of "Oh Holy Night" from Hayley Guest. Next was a hilarious poem, "A Christmas Casting", read by Vicki Hartland before the second violin solo by Flora Clapham, "1st Movement from Sonata No. 1 for Solo Violin" composed by Bach.



"Once in Royal David's City" was the penultimate carol, with the final reading by Holly Smith, and final solo being "It's the Most Wonderful Time of the Year" from Joel Rothwell. This led us in to "Oh Come All Ye Faithful", and the song "White Christmas". Shortly before we wrapped up to

enjoy some minced pies and mulled wine, BLOC
Chairperson, Sue Donovan, reminded us of the tragedy that befell the Island of Domenica in the Caribbean in September, affecting the family of Sherrie Eugene-Hart, the Sign Language Interpreter for BLOC's last two productions. Sue dedicated the final song, "Calypso Carol", to Sherrie's family, and with that the event was over for another year!

It's hard to believe that it's been over fourteen years since I did my last show with BLOC; I have never forgotten how much fun I had, and what an experience it was to perform in some special shows, and on that wonderful Hippodrome stage. I feel very fortunate that I am able to perform for a living, and that has come down to my amazingly talented family. I've been especially lucky to have been taught everything I know by my Mum Susan, who is an inspirational mother and teacher with so much passion for what she does, and my Dad Bernard, who also taught me tap in the early days. I have to say, I probably owe most of my eccentric and energetic personality to him, as a lot of you probably know. Both of them, along with my brother Tim and sister Lucy, have helped shaped me as a person and a performer and their long association with amateur dramatics in Bristol, including BLOC, has helped me a lot in my career.

I had the privilege of doing a few shows with BLOC (which was the first club, outside of my Mum's school, that I did shows with) including Fiddler on the Roof, Scrooge, Evita, and Music Man. Every show was such a joy to be a part of, because you were on this incredible stage with so many people, and as a kid I was always so excited by that - it has always been my favourite theatre to perform in in Bristol, and always remember having so much fun and always loved getting a treat from the little shop in the theatre. Through the last few years I've had the pleasure of being ale to pop in to see BLOC's rehearsals of their shows, most recently seeing their production of My Fair Lady which was brilliant. To, also, see my Dad and my Step-Mum Cheryl performing to is an extra bonus, and getting to see, my great friend, Courtney Jackson's beautiful choreography was a joy too. It's always a thrill to come back and see faces from the past, it brings a lovely feeling of nostalgia.



It seems crazy that it's been nearly ten years since I first started at The Urdang Academy and have to say it was such an exciting and daunting experience. Completely leaving home and starting a new life in London was very exciting but, also, daunting. I felt at college I really learnt that this was what I wanted to do for the rest of my life, there were, of course, ups and downs, as there are in life, but getting to live and breathe the performer's lifestyle and learning your craft is a remarkable thing.

- 1) "White Christmas", one of the most popular Christmas songs ever written, has had over five hundred recordings made, selling 150,000,000 copies. When did it first appear, what was the name of the film, and who played the two leading roles?
- 2) Peter Pan has been a perennial Christmas favourite on stage since it first arrived at the Duke of York Theatre on December 27th, 1904. It should have been December 22nd, but they had trouble with the new-fangled equipment used to enable the actors to "fly". Who did the playwright, J.M.Barrie, give the rights of Peter Pan away to in 1929?
- 3) Sir Gerald du Maurier's, the actor who originated the idea of coupling the roles of Mr Darling and Captain Hook, novelist daughter, Daphne, was a favourite writer of Alfred Hitchcock who filmed three of her stories. What were they?
- 4) Staying with the du Maurier family, Sir Gerald's father George, author and Punch cartoonist, wrote a story the title of which, when adapted for the stage, gave the name to a once extremely popular man's hat. What was the name of the hat?
- 5) George du Maurier's gothic tale also inspired Gaston Leroux to write in 1910 a story which has since been used as the basis for a successful musical. What is the title of the musical?
- 6) In Charles Dickens' A Christmas Carol, we all know that Ebenezer Scrooge's dead partner was Jacob Marley but, who was his first employer who treated him as a son?
- 7) Anthony Newley, who was the first actor to play the title role in *Scrooge* (the musical version of *A Christmas Carol*), came into prominence playing another Dickens' character in a 1948 film. What was the name of the film and the character?
- 8) "Ar Hyd y Nos" is the Welsh title of a popular hymn which is often thought of, and used as a Christmas carol. What is the English title?
